Capturing Precipitation Data



CoCoRaHS stands for the Community Collaborative Rain, Hail and Snow Network. CoCoRaHS is a nonprofit, community-based network of volunteers working together to measure and map precipitation (rain,

hail and snow). The goal is to provide the highest quality data for natural resource, education, and research applications. The National Weather Service, meteorologists, emergency managers, and the USDA are some of the organizations that use this data.





The Learys have been capturing daily precipitation data since 2009. We purchased a rain gauge from the CoCoRaHS website. The inner tube is marked to easily measure precipitation. If more than an inch falls, the liquid spills over and is captured in the larger outer tube.

Once you create an account on the website, it requires only a couple of clicks to input your daily total of precipitation. If you are away, simply collect the data upon return and enter it on the Multi-Day Report Form. Even if you don't collect data, there is a map tab where you can see the numbers

input by others not only in Buncombe County but across every state. If you would like to join the network and contribute daily data for this cause, visit www.cocorahs.org. If you have questions, feel free to contact Betty Lynne!
